Chair

focused.

Announces speaker and title of presentation, keeps session on time – use timer presides over the discussion, decides order of questioners, keeps questioners

Rapporteur

The rapporteur takes notes (English or Spanish), collects the principal answers/conclusions of the discussion, and reports back to the plenary session in pp presentation.

Facilitator

Keeps track of discussions, makes an overview Guides decision-making usually with the help of a lap top, while projecting on a screen, before departing, the facilitator leaves copies of the visuals with the local organizers.
